## TST IN 2006–2007

During 2006–2007, the Toronto School of Theology (TST) significantly strengthened its ability to serve its member colleges and their students effectively, efficiently, and responsively. We also approved, and began to implement, a creative and practical strategic plan that will help to ensure our future international leadership in theological education. Our student enrolment continued to climb. The TST corporation returned to financial health. We renewed our management staff with five excellent appointments, and improved the effectiveness of our Board of Trustees in its functions of governance.

In this report, we are able to survey only a few highlights of our progress this year. Our enterprise is a unique one, depending on the close partnership of one of the world's greatest universities, the financial support of the provincial government, the good will and commitment of our member colleges, and the generous contributions of time and money of a great many administrators, teachers, students, and members of the wider public. As a result, the TST continues to make a vital and effective contribution to theological education and scholarship in Canada and the wider world.

## THIS YEAR'S HIGHLIGHTS

*Management.* The TST management team was largely revitalized with five new appointments: Director, Director of Advanced Degree Studies, Director of the Doctor of Ministry Program, Coordinator of Academic Services and Registrar, and Administrator of Student Services. Four of these persons came from other positions in TST or its member colleges. Clear job descriptions, staff policies, management procedures, and legally compliant health and safety standards have been, or are being, developed.

*Board.* The development of the Board of Trustees, which represents the TST member colleges and wider public, has been a priority this year, with educational events, background briefings, and a retreat day. The Board's efficiency has been strengthened by reorganizing some committees, introducing mechanisms for evaluating effectiveness, and clarifying organizational responsibilities and lines of accountability. As a result, the Board exercises the functions of governance more collegially and vigorously.

The Board's most significant achievement was a strategic plan to guide TST through its next five years. The main features of this plan are:

- improving the efficiency and transparency of TST's administration;
- ensuring that TST's policies and operations meet, or exceed, the standards of the University of Toronto (U of T), the Ontario Council of Graduate Studies, and the Association of Theological Schools;
- strengthening collaboration among the colleges in planning, teaching, and curricular development; and
- participating more fully in the U of T and the wider community, including supporting partnerships in interfaith dialogue.





*Academic administration.* TST has two academic councils, each with a membership representing colleges, academic departments, and the U of T. The Basic Degree Council (BDC) has a restricted authority over most first degrees in theology. This year, under the auspices of the BDC, faculty members from all TST colleges met together to discuss educational purposes and strategies. The BDC also appointed a task force on on-line education to promote and establish TST-wide standards for on-line education.

The Advanced Degree Council (ADC) has full authority to make and administer policies for second degrees in theology, and one first degree – the Master of Arts in theology. In addition to routine operations, the ADC this year revised two degree handbooks, began a process for defining expected learning outcomes for all advanced degrees, and began reviewing our teaching of foreign research languages and procedures for comprehensive examinations for doctoral students.

*Ecumenist-in-residence.* The Very Rev., the Hon. Dr. Lois Wilson, former moderator of the United Church of Canada and a former member of the Canadian Senate, completed a very full and fruitful first year as our Ecumenist-in-residence. She has organized numerous conversations, services, forums, and conferences, and has helped to keep TST in touch with the wider interfaith community.

*Advanced Degree Students Association (ADSA).* This very active organization, under the presidency of Ellen White of St. Michael's College, sponsored interdisciplinary seminars, professional development events, social occasions, and, with the participation of the Ecumenist-in-residence, conferences on religion and public policy and other topics. The ADSA also began an arrangement allowing our advanced degree students, both native English speakers and those who speak English as a second language, to use the English Writing and Language Services at the University of Toronto.

*Doctor of Ministry (DMin) Program.* We improved educational accessibility to our DMin Program by decreasing the number of conventional courses, increasing the number of intensive residential experiences, and providing for ongoing on-line interchange. The new delivery format helped to attract a record number of applicants for the cohort beginning in June 2007, which was fully subscribed.

*Property.* TST rents its premises at 47 Queen's Park Crescent East from the University of St. Michael's College at an annual rent of \$1. TST is responsible for all maintenance, repairs, and upgrades. Special projects this year included replacing 19 windows, purchasing a new boiler, creating new space for the Advanced Degree Students Association, replacing three heat pumps, and erecting new external signage.

Eight organizations, seven of them Christian and one Buddhist, lease space in the TST building. The informal interchange that has developed among these organizations and TST promises rich ecumenical rewards.

*Libraries.* The seven TST colleges support six libraries (two colleges share one library), and TST is a partner in the huge University of Toronto library system, the largest research collection in Canada. The colleges pool funds to buy new theological books for the university system. During 2006–2007, 941 volumes were purchased from TST funds. The TST librarians meet together regularly. They sponsor a common orientation tour, produce a common brochure, and coordinate some aspects of their operations, such as acquisitions.

*Scholarships.* This year, we were thrilled to receive a very handsome donation from the Ralph M. Barford Foundation. It is being matched by a fund established by the Government of Ontario and supplemented on a one-for-two basis by the University of Toronto, so that, before the end of 2007-2008, we will have a \$250,000 endowment for the new Margaret Fleck Scholarship.

*Toronto Journal of Theology.* This academic journal, under the general editorship of Professor Abraham H. Khan of Trinity College, and financially assisted by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada, published eight scholarly articles and 23 book reviews in the fall 2006 and spring 2007 issues.





## TST REGISTRATION

The clearest evidence that the TST federation is meeting social needs and moving in the right direction is its increase in student enrolment and successful completions. Total enrolment among the seven member colleges reached 1,631 during the year. Enrolment has increased every year since 1997, when we had 990 students.

A large minority of students are training for ordained or professional pastoral ministry in a Christian denomination. Others are preparing for, or strengthening, other ministries or vocations, seeking a general academic introduction to the Bible, theology, and Christian history, or pursuing advanced research.

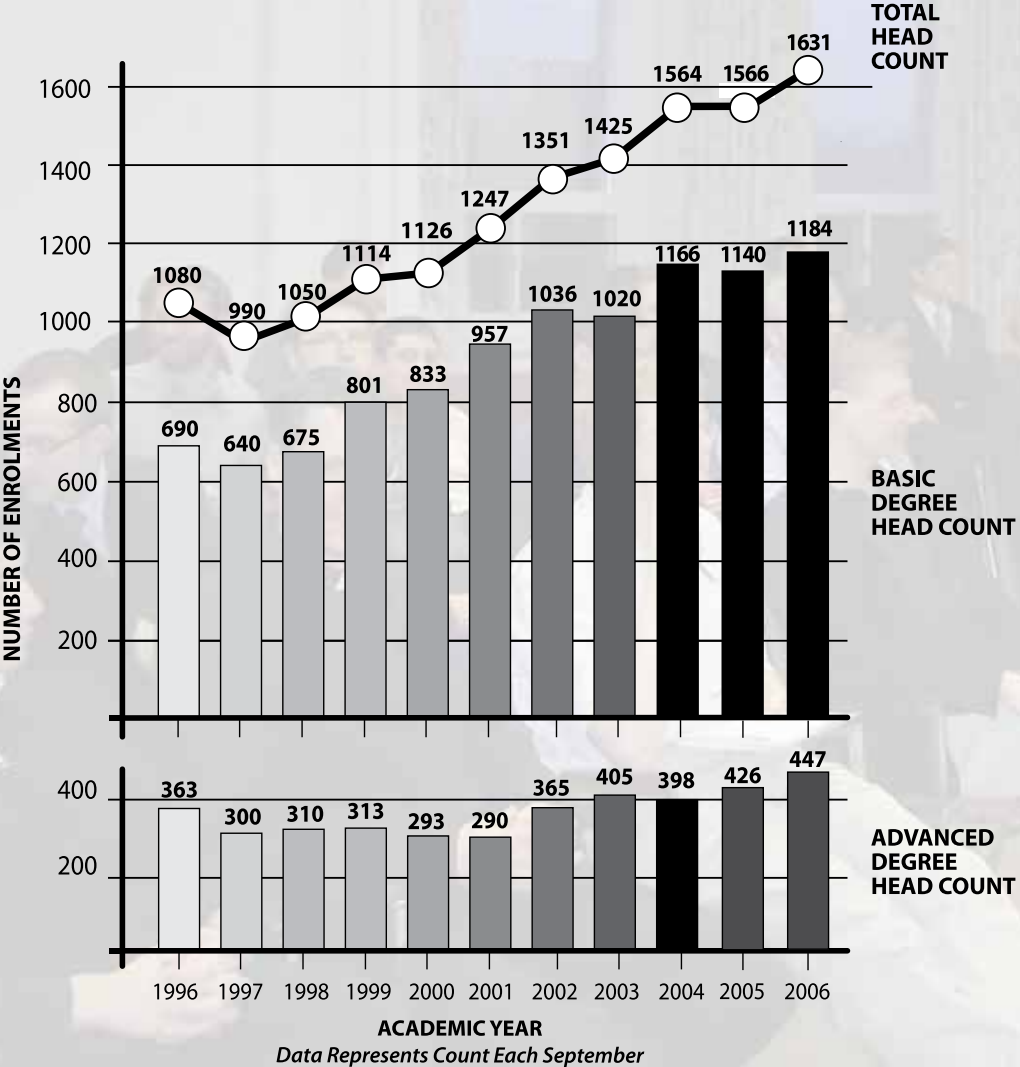
Enrolment in the advanced degree programs – Master of Arts, Master of Theology, Doctor of Theology, Doctor of Ministry, and the Doctor of Philosophy in Theology – increased to 447 in 2006, compared to 300 in 1996.

TST colleges offer a total of 11 degree programs, nine of them conjointly with the University of Toronto and TST, plus numerous diplomas and certificate programs. Our colleges graduated 212 students this year, compared to 185 last year.

This year, the TST college registrars completed an ambitious “re-engineering” project. They now can access pertinent student and course registration information from the Repository of Student Information or “ROSI,” which is the University of Toronto’s registration system, and format it according to common and specific needs. They also produced a common *Registrars’ Handbook*.

## SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

THIS YEAR, TST AWARDED SEVERAL SCHOLARSHIPS TO STUDENTS FOR 2007–2008. THIS HIGHLIGHTS A FEW RECIPIENTS.

**Jonathan Seiling**, a doctoral candidate in church history at Emmanuel, is the first recipient of the *Margaret Fleck Scholarship*, which the TST Board established in 2006 in honour of the Rev. Margaret Fleck, a former student and TST Board member. The award is a gift of the Ralph M. Barford Foundation. Jonathan found TST appealing because, he says, “as a Mennonite, there was an opportunity to interact with a broadly ecumenical student body, while participating in the activities of a Mennonite graduate student centre (Toronto Mennonite Theological Centre).”

**Jeremy Bergen**, a ThD candidate in contemporary ecclesiology at Emmanuel, received the *Saint Lazarus Bursary*, established by the Military and Hospitaller Order of St. Lazarus of Jerusalem. The bursary is awarded to a student working in the area of ecumenism. Jeremy has been the interim Director of the Toronto Mennonite Theological Centre and is active in Mennonite-Roman Catholic dialogue.

**Jaason Geerts** and **Marco Mascarin** received the *Donald Cameron Memorial Award*, established in honour of a former Chair of the TST Board. It is awarded to TST students for an activity that has had an impact on the wider community beyond the church. Jaason Geerts, a candidate for the MTS degree at St. Michael’s, directs a socially aware leadership program for Toronto Catholic youth in the Leaside area of Toronto.

Marco Mascarin, a candidate for the MAMS degree at Regis, is a documentary filmmaker whose films have featured Navajo religion and a Trappist monastery.

**Joni Sancken**, a ThD student in homiletics at Emmanuel, received the *Marjorie Watson Powles Award*, presented to a female student who is active in community and congregational life, has a strong feminist perspective and transformative vision, and demonstrates academic excellence. A graduate of Princeton Theological Seminary, Joni was a pastor in a Mennonite congregation in Philadelphia and currently contributes to a Mennonite restorative justice program in Hamilton, Ontario.

**Ellen White**, a doctoral student in the Hebrew Bible at St. Michael’s, received the *John M. Kelly Award*, given to a student who participates actively in TST governance. She is a member of the TST Board and Executive, Advanced Degree Council, and Biblical Department, and serves as President of the Advanced Degree Student Association. “Advanced studies require such a commitment,” she says, “that any time some of the financial burden is lifted from students, it’s a huge contribution.”

## TST GRADUATES 2006–2007

TST HAD 212 GRADUATES THIS YEAR. THOSE PROFILED HERE ILLUSTRATE SOME OF THEIR RANGE.

**Indrė Čuplinskas**, who graduated with a PhD in history from St. Michael's, wrote her thesis on the history of an influential Roman Catholic youth organization in Quebec. She is now an Assistant Professor in Christianity at St. Joseph's College at the University of Alberta. Before entering a doctoral program, she studied at the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven in Belgium and taught in Lithuania. Indrė supplemented her TST courses with courses at the Centre for Medieval Studies, but appreciated feeling rooted at St. Michael's. "The colleges at TST were places in which I could develop my spiritual life," she says, "allowing it to balance and sustain my academic pursuits."

**Luke Powery**, who graduated with a ThD in homiletics from Emmanuel, wrote his thesis on "The Holy Spirit and African American Preaching." He is an Assistant Professor of Homiletics at Princeton Theological Seminary. Luke was attracted to TST because of its ecumenical character, relationship with the U of T, and doctoral program in homiletics. He says his program provided the "intense, specialized work, along with a knowledge of the breadth and depth of the field necessary and appropriate for my current position in homiletics."

**Todd Townshend**, who graduated with a ThD in homiletics from Wycliffe, now teaches homiletics in the Faculty of Theology at Huron University College at the University of Western Ontario, while concurrently serving as Associate Rector of St. Aidan's Anglican Church in London. Todd came to TST because of its reputation and location, but stayed because of the faculty. He says, "My TST education has deepened and focused my ability to think theologically. It has given me the best teaching methods and theories available."

## FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

The TST corporation returned to financial health in 2006–2007 after a period of deficit spending. The improvement reflects more effective controls as well as sound planning under the guidance of an excellent financial team. Moreover, expenses were down because, during most of 2006–2007, a college dean, Professor David Neelands, doubled as TST’s interim Director. A balanced budget has been designed and approved for 2007–2008. Other financial highlights and details are reported in the next four pages.

This year, we synchronized our fiscal year with the University of Toronto and most of the TST member colleges by moving our year-end to April 30 from June 30. This change will promote ease and efficiency in administering funding flows and linking budgeting decisions. As a result, our fiscal year 2006–2007 was ten months in length.

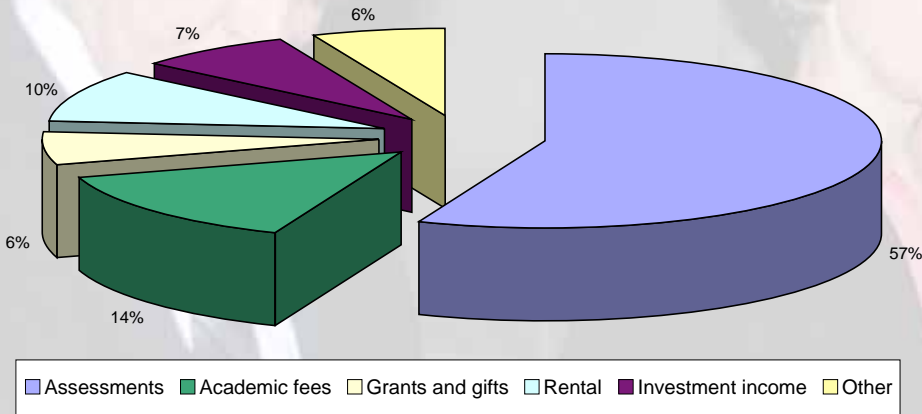
For reasons of responsible accounting, our budget discloses funding from the Government of Ontario, which we receive but then flow through to the member colleges. This year, government operating grants increased 19% to \$2.56 million from \$2.15 million in the previous year.

The increase reflects changes in government policies for the funding of postgraduate education, together with previously increased levels of government funding for our Master of Theology and Doctor of Theology degrees. This higher level of government funding is expected to be maintained or to increase further.

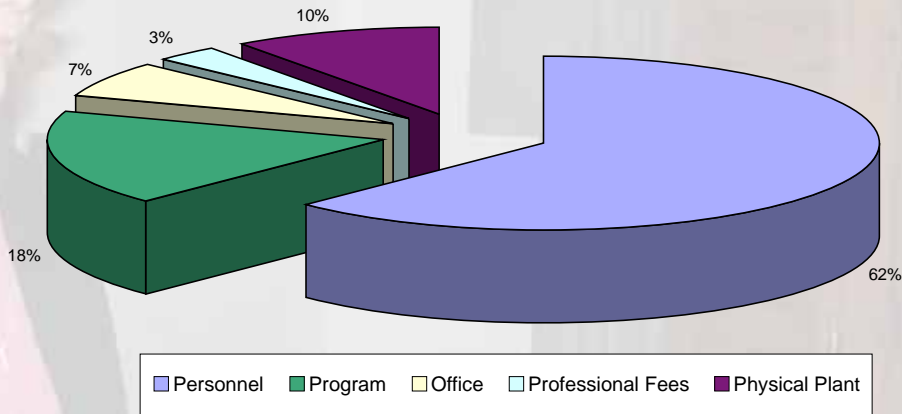
This year, for the first time, the development officers of the TST and the member colleges also began meeting together.

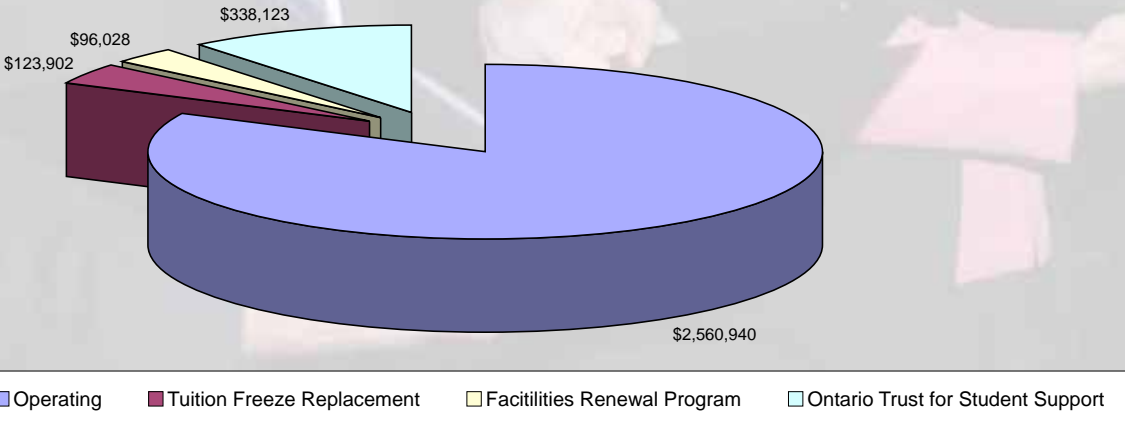
### TST GENERAL FUND REVENUE - 2006-2007

## DONATIONS AND GRANTS

Although TST receives most of its operating revenue from our member colleges, the generous support of individuals, churches, foundations, agencies, and religious communities enables us to significantly extend our ministry.

Our “Working together” campaign was developed to respond to four needs:

- we have been strengthening and extending our Doctor of Ministry Program through a new educational format that combines intensive residencies and distance learning technologies;
- we have renovated the TST building to accommodate a cluster of not-for-profit ecumenical organizations;
- we are beginning formal dialogue with other faith communities in the University of Toronto; and
- we have started to endow a chair for the TST Director.

In addition to the “Working together” campaign, we are inviting gifts to help us assist students in financial need. A gift of \$150,000, when matched by the Ontario Trust for Student Support, will endow a handsome named scholarship. We also invite smaller gifts to improve our existing scholarships and bursaries. In particular, we’re strongly hoping in 2007–2008 to complete the endowment of the Michael Steinhäuser Scholarship for a doctoral student in Biblical studies.
