## EMB1511: Elementary New Testament Greek, Part I

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#### **Purpose**

Despite the centrality of the Bible to Christianity, most adherents are unable to read its texts in the original language – instead relying upon translations. These translations, while useful, often obscure nuance of these texts, such that ministers, theologians, and scholars of religion benefit from its study. The purpose of this course is to acquaint students with the grammar, syntax, and vocabulary of New Testament Greek.

#### **Learning Objectives**

By the end of the first semester the student will be able to:

• Read simple sentences in Greek in the indicative mood

By the end of the second semester the student will be able to:

• Read more complex sentences in Greek and read New Testament texts with the aid of a lexicon

- In-class lectures from instructor
- Reading before class
- Weekly quizzes
- Mid-term and final examination

#### **Student Assessment**

Students will be assessed based upon:

- Weekly quizzes (40% best 7 of 8)

- Classroom participation and in-class exercises (10%)

### **Attendance Policy**

#### **Note on Marks**

Since the aim of the course is for students to be able to begin to read the New Testament in its original language, students' progress will be evaluated according to the following criteria corresponding to the TST Basic Degree Handbook. What this means in practice is that I will calculate a raw score for each student on the basis of the weights given in the syllabus, and assign a final grade according to the above criteria. **Students should note that there is no mathematical relationship between the raw score and the final grade**. (For example, I might deem that a raw score of 167/185 constitutes "excellent" work and therefore corresponds to a letter grade of A- on the grade scale.) For this reason, I will inform students of their standing in the course at the mid-point in the term by assigning them a provisional grade on the basis of their score on the midterm exam. If you have questions about your mark at other points during the semester, I invite you to approach the instructor to ask.
